

From the Fire Chief

For months now, we at the OCFA have prepared our agency and the communities we serve with a stark reality:

Dear OCFA Family:

The record rains of winter and spring could result in record wildfires in summer and fall. Varying weather patterns and increased fuel loads aside, our wildfire suppression performance goal remains unwavering: Keep all vegetation fires 10 acres or less 95% of the time. With rare exceptions, the OCFA consistently meets this goal thanks in large part to our proactive and ongoing training and preparation. Case in point, in May, Chiefs Perkins and Sherwood sent a Wildland Response

Expectations Memo, bolstering efforts in everything from wildland fire training and firefighter PPE inspections to Strike Team refresher courses and the review of historic fire behavior in our region. At the same time, when not assigned to wildfires in- and out-of-county, our Hand Crews have been hard at work on hazardous fuels reduction and restoring fire roads washed out during the rains. Not to be outdone, our Community Risk Reduction team elevated their year-round work of engaging and educating our communities on vegetation management, home hardening, and defensible space. Corporate Communications kicked off our Wildfire Awareness campaign and launched a new PSA that speaks to the

All the while, OCFA led the expansion of game-changing wildfire resources that better protect not just our county but the entire region and state. The Quick Reaction Force (QRF), which we innovated with Southern California Edison back in 2019, has now upgraded from one to three Boeing CH-47 Helitankers. On top of that, FIRIS, which we piloted and built, just transitioned to a state-wide program, and the Director of Cal OES, the Fire Chief of Cal OES, and the Governor of California publicly thanked us for our vision and work in creating

So, where does all this training, preparation, and innovation leave us in achieving our goal to keep all wildfires 10 acres or less 95% of the time? As you all know, over the past month, that goal has been tested by numerous vegetation fires in Orange County, and all of them were put to bed well under our 10-acre goal, often in collaboration with our partners, including Naval Weapons Station 31, CAL FIRE / Riverside, Laguna Beach Fire Department, Orange City Fire Department, and Anaheim Fire & Rescue. All this, while our firefighters continue to respond to 500 in-county calls a day and provide out-of-county

assistance on wildfires raging around the state. And of course, the behind-the-scenes excellence of our professional staff continues to drive and support our success. Thank you, all of you — from HR, CRR, and Fleet Services to ECC, EMS, and Field Operations. Your flat-out and full-throttle wildfire prevention and suppression work coupled with the kindness and care you instill in our communities on every call is as inspiring as it is lifesaving.
